

SUBJECT: Ammunition Amnesty Program (Garrison Policy #40)

1. Reference: AR 710-2, Supply Policy Below the National Level, dated 28 March 2008.
2. Purpose: The US Army Ammunition Amnesty Program is intended to ensure maximum recovery of military ammunition items outside the supply system. It is not intended to circumvent normal turn-in procedures. The amnesty program provides an opportunity for individuals to return ammunition found, stolen, or misplaced without fear of prosecution.
3. General: Amnesty turn-ins will not be the basis for initiation of an investigation or prosecution and are exempt from AR 190 series investigation requirements.
4. Policy:
 - a. Ammunition or explosives (live or expended) found on or off the installation may be turned in to the Ammunition Supply Point (ASP) at any time day or night, seven (7) days a week. Under the Ammunition Amnesty Program, no paperwork is required to turn in any ammunition. During normal duty hours of 0800 to 1630, ammunition can be brought to the Ammunition Surveillance Office, ASP, Building 2201. During non-duty hours, 1630 to 0800, ammunition may be placed in the Amnesty box.
 - b. Amnesty box is on the East side of the ASP POV parking area as shown in the diagram.



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c. Ammunition found off installation.

(1) Extreme care must be taken when receiving ammunition from off installation sources. Old war trophies and souvenirs can be extremely unstable. If there is any question as to the safety or stability of any item being turned in, do the following:

(a) Carefully secure and isolate the item.

(b) Immediately contact the Military Police (MP) Desk at 353-7535 and request the MP Desk contact the Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) personnel on call.

(c) Await the arrival of EOD.

(2) If determined to be unsafe, EOD will dispose of the ammunition or explosive immediately.

(3) Once EOD has cleared the ammunition, it can be transported to the ASP.

d. Ammunition found on installation.

(1) All FOI (Found on Installation) ammunition will be considered hazardous. Small arms ammunition has a minimum hazard (up to and including caliber .50). All FOI ammunition will not be moved by untrained personnel. Notify Range Control directly or the MPs to evaluate the ammunition and contact EOD as required. In the event those personnel are unable to respond, contact the QASAS at the Ammunition Surveillance Office, ASP, Building 2201, 353-6593 or cell 322-9996 for assistance.


(2) Small arms ammunition (up to and including caliber .50) while hazardous, has a minimum hazard. It may be transported to the ASP for immediate turn-in.

(3) After evaluation, EOD will dispose of as required or clear it to be moved to the ASP.

e. Amnesty Day. An installation amnesty day will be scheduled annually to assist in the collection of abandoned or unauthorized ammunition. The amnesty day will receive wide spread publicity on the installation and in the surrounding civilian communities.

5. This policy supersedes Garrison Policy #40, SAB, dated 7 Apr 14.
